

# MERIT SCHOLARSHIPS

## What is a merit scholarship?

Merit scholarships are a type of institutional aid that is awarded to every student that meets our minimum requirements for acceptance. Merit scholarships are determined by evaluating the combination of each student's individual GPA, class rank and ACT/SAT scores.

## How do I apply for a merit scholarship?

When a student fills out an application for admission and submits the necessary documents for acceptance, they are automatically considered for a merit scholarship. No further application is needed.

## Are merit scholarships renewable?

Yes, all merit scholarships are renewable for four years as long as a student maintains a 2.8 GPA or above. Students do not need to reapply in order to receive the merit scholarship.

## Is there a deadline to receive the merit scholarship?

There is no deadline as merit scholarships are awarded at the time a student is accepted. Students who apply before April of their senior year can continue to submit their highest GPA, class rank and test scores to receive the maximum amount of scholarship possible through April 1st.

## Does Campbellsville University use weighed GPAs when calculating merit scholarships?

Yes, if a student submits a transcript that lists a weighted GPA scale, the weighted GPA will be used to evaluate a student's merit scholarship. If no weighted GPA is provided on the transcript, the standard 4.0 GPA scale will be used.

## How can I find out what my merit scholarship will be?

Once the amounts for merit scholarships have been determined (usually during the fall semester), students will be told their merit scholarship amount within the acceptance letter to Campbellsville University. Students can contact their admissions counselor if they did not receive their scholarship amount or if they have any questions regarding their scholarship.
