

CU alums serving as elected public officials

Larry Blanton and Sandra Clark met as students at Campbellsville University more than 40 years ago, and today, they are married and both serve as elected public officials in Indiana.

Larry Blanton, who was born in Crab Orchard, Ky., and raised in Orange County, Ind., has served as circuit judge for Orange County since July 1997.

Sandra Blanton is Indiana State Representative for House District 62 where she's served since November 2007. She was born in Shelbyville, Ky., and raised in Louisville, Ky.

The Clarks moved to Campbellsville during her senior year of high school when her father, Dr. Robert Clark, vice president for academic affairs emeritus at CU, became associated with Campbellsville University.

"Obviously, I was going to CU," she said.

She is now glad she ended up going to CU, since it's where she met her husband of 40 years.

"Larry and I met when I was in my second year, and he was a senior, graduating in January 1969," Sandra said. Larry attended CU upon his graduation from Paoli High School.

"Mother wanted me to be more like my uncle, Tinsley Ball, who graduated from CU," Larry said. "She thought he turned out pretty well, becoming a Baptist preacher and all."

"I had other ideas—had applications to two other schools filled out. At mother's insistence, I also filled out one to CU. Only into my first semester did I find out that the application to CU got mailed; the other two did not."

Larry Blanton said he has since forgiven his mother.

After he received his bachelor of science degree from CU in sociology with a history minor, the couple married and moved to Paoli, Ind., where he became a teacher and coach at Mitchell Junior High School.

The couple returned to Campbellsville in 1976, when Larry became owner of Polk's Department Store. Sandra returned to CU to finish her bachelor's degree in business administration, then worked as an accountant for Parker-Kalon for 20 years. Larry went on to get a master's degree in public administration from Western Kentucky University, followed by a doctor of jurisprudence from the University of Louisville.

He began practicing law in Jeffersonville, Ind., and Louisville until his appointment as circuit judge in Indiana.

"It is our responsibility, as graduates of Campbellsville College, to adhere to the principles of Christian service," Sandra said.

"Too many have forgotten that the responsibility of all governments from the local to the national level is to protect those among us who are least able to protect themselves."

Sandra said she doesn't think anyone realizes how much time is spent in a public service position. She said both her and Larry's positions "are 24/7."

"It's been quite a revelation to me about how much hard work this is. It can be all consuming," she said, but "the rewards are many."

"When you can actually help someone with their problem and see a good result it is the very best feeling," Sandra said.

"So many people have serious problems with state bureaucracy. They call on me for help. It is wonderful to be able to help."

She said, "Those who sit back and complain about their government have to step up and get involved."

As a judge, Larry has developed several programs to help with children, his wife said.

She said local schools have requested he talk to children who have been in trouble or caused problems, and he has those children come to court.

"If you can help one child and improve their life...you have achieved much," Sandra said.



Second annual Cardboard Nation event raises \$4,000

Several cardboard boxes glittered the main lawn at Campbellsville University as the Carver School of Social Work attempted to imitate the experience of being homeless for one night.

The Social Workers in Touch Can Help (SWITCH) Club, an organized club in the social work program, hosted the event on Friday, April 17 through Saturday, April 18, on CU's Stapp Lawn.

The SWITCH Club president, Diana Gardiner of Erwin, Tenn., said the purpose of the event was to raise money for Green River Ministries, a homeless shelter located in Campbellsville, by illustrating what it felt like to be homeless for one night.

To implement the experience, she said participants were asked to spend the night in a cardboard box with the

comfort of only one item, a blanket. Each participant was given a box after they produced the rent fee, which was a minimum of \$25. In addition, the participants were encouraged to raise sponsorship money, with the proceeds going to Green River Ministries.

"The event was very successful," Gardiner said. "We had over 20 people stay the entire night, and we raised around \$4,000 for the Green River Ministries."

Green River Ministries provides housing, rent and utility assistance to the community of Campbellsville. It celebrated its third anniversary in August 2009. Since its opening, the ministry has received more than 200 requests for housing and other services.

CU employs new nursing dean

Wade is working on a Ph.D. in leadership in higher education from Capella University. In 2002 he received a master of science in nursing administration from Bellarmine University. His bachelor of science in nursing was received in 1997 from Spalding University.

Students aid local community and accept Christ during KHO camps

Several Campbellville University students spent the summer working with Kentucky Heartland Outreach as staff members overseeing construction projects at homes throughout the community.

Nine CU students worked with 308 students and adults from various churches from across the country and built decks, repaired roofs and siding, painted and built ramps at 22 homes in Taylor, Green and Adair counties during the early part of the summer for six weeks, and in July they worked for three weeks with 345 volunteers at 32 homes in Barren, Metcalfe and Hart Counties.

Todd Parish, executive director of KHO, said during the first week 12 students and two homeowners made a first-time profession of faith.

During the course of the camps, more than 60 students and homeowners were saved, according to Brian Hensley, camp pastor. There were also numerous calls to ministry and missions.

John Chowning, vice president for church and external relations and

executive assistant to the president, said the lives of thousands of young people have been positively impacted by the servant ministry opportunities provided by KHO home repair experiences.

Laura Hatfield ('07), administrative assistant for KHO and a camp volunteer, said the homeowners were "very appreciative" of the work being done for them.

Sherrie Haldeman with Ascension Lutheran Church said, "My youth group had another great experience this year. We had three youth recommit themselves to Christ, two who want to be KHO interns when they graduate high school and one who has decided that Campbellville is the college for her."

"CU is grateful for the opportunity to continue to be involved in the work of the Kentucky Heartland Outreach as homes are repaired and constructed around the region, young people give of themselves in Christian service to others, and we see numerous professions of faith made by both homeowners and those working," Chowning said.

God is first. Family is second, and football is third.

This is former Campbellsville University Football Coach Ron Finley's philosophy, and former players repeatedly echoed it during an endowed scholarship dinner in his honor May 29 at Winters Dining Hall.

About \$3,000 was raised during the dinner, according to Chuck Vaughn, director of the Big Maroon Club, who was in charge of the dinner. Finley started football in 1987, after a 30-year absence at CU. He coached that first junior varsity team in 1987 and coached varsity until 2002.

Former players Nick Thurmond ('01), Shannon Stephens ('96), Charles "Junior" Higdon ('98), David Delk ('91) and Chris Morgan ('97) told of their days on the football team and what Finley meant to them.

"Discipline" and "love" were two words that were mentioned often in their speeches.

"Coach Finley made me a better man, a better husband, a better father and a better person," Morgan said.

"He developed young men into successful men," Thurmond said.

A Finley saying Stephens quoted was one the coach pointed out when a player had lost a girlfriend. "Women are like street cars," Finley said, "one comes round every 10 minutes." Stephens said Finley urged the football players to always date a woman they'd be pleased to take home to their parents.

Higdon said that Finley's most important lesson came through—to live the life, talk the talk and walk the walk—as Finley did.

"To us players, there couldn't be as good a man as Finley. He loved you and loved the Lord," Higdon said.

Delk said Finley had a "great vision" when he began the CU football program in 1987.

Vaughn read a letter from a former player, David Cozart, a 1994 graduate who lives in Lexington, who said he was grateful to Finley and respected him and appreciated him.

In response to the "testimonials" from his former players, Finley said he was "humbled" at the attendance at the dinner. About 40 former football players attended with about 125 in total attendance.

Finley said everything he and his coaches did was for the good or benefit of the young men.

"There is nothing more important than love and discipline," he said.

"It's been a tremendous run, and I appreciate so much this honor," Finley said. "I love you all."

Eubank receives 17th annual Excellence in Teaching Award for tenured faculty member

Dr. Damon Eubank, professor of history at Campbellville University, received the 17th Annual Advancement Board Excellence in Teaching Award for tenured faculty at CU's annual Honors and Awards Day.

The award is given annually to a faculty member who has excelled.

Eubank said he gives credit for "whatever talent I may have to Jesus Christ who gave me those gifts in the first place."

He said he also gives credit to his former professors at CU, the late Dr. Bill Bennett and the late Dr. B.R. "Bobby" Himes, "who both taught me much about how to teach and relate to students."

Eubank joined the faculty of Campbellville College in 1989 after completing his bachelor's degree in history in 1981 from Campbellville College, a master's degree from Auburn University in 1984, and his Ph.D. in history from Mississippi State University in 1989.

In his 20 years at CU, Eubank has approximately 15 students who have finished law school, over 50 who have

earned master's degrees and two who have either completed or are currently working on Ph.D. programs.

He has developed a new course on the Holocaust and hopes to take a group of his students to Poland. He is working on a course in "Ancient History" with the intent of taking students to Greece and Italy.

Eubank has published numerous articles and over 100 book and article reviews. He published a book in 2004 and has a second one scheduled to be published this year.

Eubank is a member of several scholarly associations, including the Southern Historical Society, the Society of Civil War Historians, the Kentucky Historical Society and the Filson Club.

He is active in Campbellville Baptist Church.

He is married to Lori Jadwin Eubank, who formerly taught at Campbellville University, and they have two children, Lorin and Micah. He is the son of Frank and Louise Eubank of Vine Grove, Ky., and the late Elizabeth Eubank.

A leading healthcare administrator from Louisville was honored Memorial Day weekend by Campbellsville University at its Louisville Campus.

Campbellsville University's Advancement Board has awarded Louisville attorney Terry Black, a 1966 graduate of CU, with the first annual Derby Rose Gala Award. Board member Stephen Horner ('65) made the announcement at the first Derby Rose Gala recently on campus.

"Terry Black was unanimously selected by the Advancement Board to be the first recipient of the Derby Rose Gala Award," Horner said. Bryan Fuller pitches 21 innings in 26 hours; Tigers head to NAIA World Series

Bryan Fuller used to be a solid bullpen pitcher whose arm the Campbellsville University Tigers could depend on in important games. Today, even though he's still a dependable force out of the pen, he's the face of the Tigers, having become a national television, YouTube, and blog celebrity after his 21 innings in 26 hours performance in May at the Super Regional in Lindenwood, Mo.

But Fuller was taking it all in stride recently as his team gathered for one last home practice before heading to Indianapolis for a flight to Lewiston, Idaho and their first-ever appearance in the Avista NAIA World Series.

"It hasn't affected me one bit," Fuller said as teammates walked by poking good fun at him. "It's been unbelievable. It still hasn't sunk in."

Jeremy Schaap, SportsCenter reporter, flew in from New York along with a production crew and watched two hours of fielding and batting practice and then interviewed Fuller and head coach Beauford Sanders.

The team seemed to be taking it all in stride as well, like an ESPN reporter shows up every day at practice.

One player joked that Schaap was working on his next movie - *The Bryan Fuller Story* - with Fuller playing himself and Brad Pitt playing the role of pitching coach Scott Hortness.

"It's interesting because he pitched so well and now they're going to the World Series," Schaap said.

When folks at ESPN first heard about Fuller pitching 21 innings in a two-day

span they thought the worst. That the coaching staff didn't care about their players' well being.

"That was our first thought," said Tina Cerbone, an ESPN producer. "We found out different after we talked to them."

Schaap was looking forward to the piece because he loves the amateur, innocent side of sports.

"We're dealing with a pure amateur here," Schaap said before the interview, which was conducted along the first-base line at the Tiger baseball field. "It's just a nice story about something we don't hear about that often."

The piece aired on SportsCenter in May.

"It's all good," said a smiling Sanders as he watched his players take batting practice.

When asked if he thought he'd ever see Jeremy Schaap in Campbellsville, he said: "I can honestly say that thought never crossed my mind."

Campbellsville was to leave to catch its flight at noon, but Schaap's interview spilled over into the noon hour and then Campbellsville Mayor Brenda Allen and Taylor County Judge/Executive Eddie Rogers showed up, along with several university staff, to proclaim May 22 "Campbellsville University Tigers Baseball Day."

Fuller's individual accomplishment could well overshadow the body of work

of an entire team - a squad that had just won its first region title and berth in the World Series.

But the players were savvy enough to know that what has become good for Bryan Fuller was good for the whole team, the school and the community.

The ESPN production crew was presented baseball-style caps from Director of Athletics Rusty Hollingsworth and the audio man said he'd be wearing his while working the Indianapolis 500.

You can go out and purchase all kinds of advertising and marketing material, but what Bryan Fuller did in 21 innings was put Campbellsville on a lot of people's maps.

And the coach said it certainly would help recruiting.

If only they could have talked Schaap into wearing a university T-shirt during the interview. That would have brought it full circle.

(The Tigers were ousted in the second game they played in the World Series. Bryan Fuller was married during the summer and will participate in the 2009 Fall League of Super Independent Baseball. The Fall League will consist of a player combine, a player draft, an 18-game regular season, and a college World Series style play-off. CU sports had great year in 2008-09

Just when you thought it couldn't get much better, it did.

What started as a good year in sports in 2008 ended as a great year for just about everything athletic at Campbellsville University as the 2008 calendar flipped to spring semester 2009.

Nine coaches won Mid-South Coach of the Year honors and five teams and one individual won Mid-South Conference titles. Not bad.

It all started in the fall. That's when CU's women's cross country team qualified for nationals by winning the MSC meet and the men's and women's soccer teams improved immensely.

The soccer men improved by seven wins over their previous year's performance and the team finished second in the Mid-South and fourth in the National Christian College Athletic Association tournament. The women had their most successful season ever, posting a 12-7-3 mark and a trip to the region finals of the NCCAA.

Swimming hosted its first home meet since re-instituting the program two years ago and qualified five individuals and five relay teams for nationals.

Volleyball kept rolling along with a 35-11 mark and 3.49 team GPA. The team reached the semi-finals of the NCCAA and were ranked as high as 17th in all of the NAIA.

Second-year football coach Perry Thomas is slowly building his program as more than 160 players (91 newcomers) reported when fall drills began in August.

Lady Tiger basketball returned to the national picture with an impressive regular season victory (26-7 overall record) in the Mid-South and a trip to Jackson, Tenn., for the national tournament.

Cheerleading was impressive as well, winning its second MSC title in three years.

Wrestling continued to post numbers that gained CU national recognition that pinned the squad a seventh place finish

nationally after a 10-8 duel-meet record and team GPA of 3.1428.

Men's golf produced an individual winner as Logan Griffin won the Mid-South by carding birdies on the final five holes of the two-day conference tournament.

Men's tennis finished with its best record (10-5) in recent years and reached the semis of the NCCAA tournament.

Track and field gained some traction, qualifying one player for the NAIA meet and nine individuals and two relays for the NCCAA.

The softball team posted a 40-7-1 record and Mid-South regular season championship.

And the university added a new sport—bowling.

But CU baseball saved the best for last.

The team won its first-ever regional tournament and a berth in the NAIA World Series in thrilling fashion.

Great stuff, but there's more.

Campbellsville University milked every ounce of publicity from that heart-pumping baseball region title game and was featured, along with well-known sportscaster Jeremy Schaap, on ESPN.

As Beauford Sanders, Tiger baseball coach, said: "It's all good."

And it was.

Senior pitcher Bryan Fuller hurled 21 scoreless innings in the region tournament, attracting the kind of national publicity that usually only money can buy.

Eighty-nine student-athletes attained scholar athlete status by maintaining at least a 3.25 GPA. That number was restricted only by the fact that the Mid-South and the NAIA do not recognize the classroom performances of freshmen.

Yes, 2008-09 was a big year. But with the nucleuses of many of CU's teams returning and another good recruiting year, 2009-2010 could be just as exciting.

A. 175




