#### **CLASS PIANO 146 SRING 2017**

**Required text**: Alfred's Group Piano for Adults by E. L. Lancaster/Renfrow

Book 1, 2<sup>nd</sup> Edition. Published by Alfred Publisher, 2004 ISBN 0-697-04393-2

**Prerequisites:** Basic knowledge of music rudiments and able to play a simple piece using both hands together.

#### Technique:

• All major scales and white-key minor scales (three forms), 2 octaves, hands together with melodic and rhythmic evenness, as well as correct fingerings.

Minimum speed: eighth notes at = 80.

• Triads in inversions

#### Reading:

- Sight Reading: pattern recognition, melodies with chordal accompaniment
- Score Reading: two adjacent and non-adjacent voice parts from choral scores
- Hymn Reading: Four-Part Hymns (HAMBURG, MORE LOVE TO THEE, and STILLE NACHT)
- Repertoire: elementary to early intermediate levels of difficulty

## **Harmonization and Keyboard Theory:**

- Use primary and secondary chords (ii, vi, V/V) with appropriate accompaniment patterns to harmonize melodies while reading the chords from functional and pop notation
- Use primary and secondary chords (ii and V/V) to harmonize by ear folk songs, children's songs, and hymn tunes (BREAD OF LIFE and OLIVET).
- Transpose harmonization examples to closely related keys (C, F, G, D)
- Transpose simple melodies 1-2 half steps in either direction

#### Improvisation:

- Create simple melodies over a given chord progression
- Use blues pentascale to improvise melodies over a 12-bar blues progression

## **Ensemble:**

 Accompaniment: the study of two easy pieces of contrasting textures or periods which do not double the vocal line

Perform in class various ensemble pieces and activities (from Alfred's Group Piano for Adults, or similar)

## At the conclusion of Class Piano II (MUS 146) for Music Major or Minor

All students who are music minors must take the Piano Proficiency Exam for Music Minors at the end of the semester. Music Majors must take Part I of the Proficiency Exam. Failure to take the exam would automatically result in a semester grade of "I", regardless of success earlier in the semester. However, the result of this examination does not affect the grade for this course.

#### Technique

All major scales and white-key minor scales (three forms), 2 octaves, hands together with melodic and rhythmic evenness, as well as correct fingerings.

Minimum speed: eighth notes at J = 80.

#### Repertoire

Perform an intermediate level piano composition with accurate notes, rhythms, fingering, dynamics, articulation, and a general sense of fluency/musicality.

#### Harmonization

Harmonize a melody using primary and secondary chords (ii, vi, and V/V) in major and minor keys with correct voice leading while reading the chords from functional and/or pop notation. Use appropriate accompaniment patterns (specific examples provided to student in advance).
