

The summer of 2011 has been a very busy and exciting time at Campbellsville University.

We have experienced a flurry of successful milestones, including another record summer school enrollment, a record number of visitors (nearly 5,000) for our summer camps and conferences, completion of 48 additional beds of women's housing, a series of LINC orientation sessions for our new incoming students for fall 2011, productive meetings of several support groups (Church Relations Council, Advancement Board, Board of Alumni, and others) and the Board of Trustees, and several renovation projects and landscaping improvements across the campus.

This issue of the *Campbellsvillian* contains a number of very interesting stories and updates. There is an emphasis on several alumni, including some of our younger alumni who are doing very well in their professional studies, missions and ministries, and chosen professions.

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

Fall 2011 brings new improvements to match the growth of campus

Each new semester brings excitement as new and returning students fill up the residence halls rooms, campus swings and the dining hall. Fall 2011 brings even more excitement with new additions and improvements to campus life.

Andrew Ward, director of student activities and intramurals, said, "We're really excited about the line-up of activities. There will be about 30 activities in the first two weeks, mixing in new events with some of the traditional returning events."

New events for Welcome Week and Freshman Week include: Christian comedian HB Sanders, Baptist Campus Ministry BBQ, intramural showcase, lake day at Green River Lake and Pool Olympics.

Several popular events will be returning such as the Welcome Week Festival, Snack Attack, CU Cinema and movie on the lawn. Campbellsville University will also attempt a new world record: largest game of red light/green light.

The first major improvement, a new 48-bed Women's Residence Village, will be completed upon the start of the new semester. This also includes the first-ever ladies-only wellness center.

Dr. Michael V. Carter, president of CU, said, "This wellness area is intended to give privacy and practicality for our women who want to use a nice private area for cardiovascular and other types of workouts. We hope to have some new equipment for The Tuggle-Morris Wellness Center, which is co-ed, by the time fall starts."

The second improvement to campus is the addition of a Chick-fil-A Express to the Davenport Student Commons, expected to open in the fall. Students will have a set amount of credit from their meal plan that can be applied to purchases in the Chick-fil-A Express.

In addition, a new parking lot will have designated parking for individuals wanting to visit locations around the

Heilman Student Complex, such as Starbucks®, Barnes and Noble Bookstore, Chick-fil-A Express or the Winters Dining Hall.

Other improvements include new technology for several classrooms and an improved student entrance with a widened stairway into the lower level of Druen Hall. A new intramural field, located behind Finley Stadium, will provide some new green space for a variety of purposes. Some remodeling has also been completed on South Hall.

Several other additions to campus are expected to start soon.

Carter said, "I am excited about several projects that we are working on at present that we hope to start on in the not too distant future."

These include a new wellness center that will be larger and have more options for students, a new park entrance for the campus that will provide beautiful areas for sitting and



walking, improved visual arts area and the new School of Business building.

Carter said, "Each of these will happen, but we need to continue to raise money for them."

Enrollment for fall 2011 is also looking up.

Dave Walters, vice president for admissions and students services, said, "The entire admissions staff along with many others on campus have worked extremely hard to enroll our incoming class for fall 2011. Each admission counselor participated in nearly 200 college fairs, college visits and other events, including high school visits to share the Campbellsville University story.

"It has been an exciting year as we have seen a spike in interest in Campbellsville University. Each day the admissions office handles visits from literally all over the country. It's not unusual for a family to drop in and visit our campus while on vacation or visiting

relatives and friends in the area. We have families visit all the way from California and Maryland."

Walters credits the administrative team with the interest being generated in Campbellsville University.

The team provides students with the "best service, education and opportunities for their future."

"We all look forward to seeing all our students return to campus each fall," Walters said. "We are especially excited when we see each new student arrive and begin their personal journey in higher education. We count it a blessing and a privilege to be a part of the journey in each student's life."

Carter said, "We must all continue to look to God for leadership and direction. CU is a place where we want to keep Christ first in an environment where serious academic inquiry takes place."

Matt Feltner on path to become podiatrist

“Good things happen to those who work hard and have a passion for what they do” is what Matt Feltner’s parents taught him. It has served him well as he studies at The Ohio College of Podiatric Medicine and Surgery in Cleveland, Ohio.

Feltner, a 2008 graduate of Campbellsville University, is in his fourth and final year of study to be a podiatrist and will begin a three-year surgical residency specializing in foot and ankle medicine and surgery. Following residency training, he may pursue a one-year fellowship to further specialize in an area of medicine or surgery.

Feltner is the son of Dr. Doug Feltner, member of Campbellsville University’s Board of Trustees, and his wife, Barbara. Dr. Doug Feltner is a practicing family physician in Greensburg and Campbellsville.

“My father greatly influenced my career path,” Feltner said. He worked at his father’s family practice in Campbellsville for seven years, starting in high school and until he began school in Cleveland in the summer of 2008.

“I became very interested in medicine while working there, and I loved the patient interaction that I experienced. Seeing how hard my dad works every single day and the knowledge base you have to obtain in medical school and residency and maintain through the years of practicing medicine gave me a first-hand experience of what it takes to be a great doctor, and something that I can strive for now and in the future,” he said.

“My dad, along with my mom, has given me advice on a daily basis since I began this long journey, and the resounding line that always stays in the back of my head is that good things happen to those who work hard and have a passion for what they do. As simple as it may be, it is very true and can be applied to anything you do in life,” he said.

Feltner spends his days in surgery, starting at 6 a.m. assisting the surgeons

with multiple cases. On average he sees five-10 surgical cases per day. He then goes on rounds with the resident physicians in the area hospitals. In the afternoons, he spends time at either a diabetic wound clinic or an orthopedic surgery private practice treating patients with foot and ankle problems.

His day usually comes to an end anywhere from 7 p.m. to midnight, but he is also on call for trauma which could easily extend through all hours of the night.

“My schedule is demanding right now, but I am loving every minute of it,” Feltner said.

He said CU has made a “profound difference in the lives of many students, including mine.” He said CU helped him find his profession in many ways, but more importantly “it helped me grow as Christian.” Feltner majored in biology while a student at CU with a minor in

chemistry. He also was a member of the CU basketball team.

Feltner said, “CU is growing exponentially, but it still provides a small class size so you can get to know your professors personally.

“That is what helped me the most in school because not only could I go to the professors for help in a class, I could also go to them at anytime to talk about anything, especially the decisions I was making toward a career choice, and they would always be there for me.

“I realize how great CU is and how much it gave to me, and I one day hope to give back to the university.”

The show, produced by Jeannie Clark, WLCU producer at CU, brought together talent from within the new areas of emphasis in broadcast journalism. Students receive hands-on experience in broadcasting and digital media, journalism, photojournalism and public relations as part of the mass communication department at CU.

Special guests on the show were Dr. J. Chester Porter, chairman, and Maria L. Bouvette, president/CEO of Louisville's Porter Bancorp Inc., who have given the lead gifts for the expansion of the School of Business and Economics which will now bear their names. The J. Chester Porter-Maria L. Bouvette School of Business and Economics will be housed in a new building to be built between Ransdell Chapel and Broadway Hall on the main campus.

The owner of Porter & Associates law firm, Porter earned the juris doctorate degree from the University of Louisville after receiving his bachelor's degree in economics in 1962 from Campbellsville University which named him Distinguished Alumnus in 1985.

The show's live broadcast from the Louisville Education Center continues Campbellsville University's broadening scope as it grows past 3,000 students and establishes more regional centers for student flexibility.

"This is another, among many ways, in which we are working very hard to share the story and mission of Campbellsville University to an increasingly growing audience," Carter said.

Campbellsville University hosts 43 different camp groups over the summer

Campbellsville University hosted 43 different camps and 5,000 campers for church groups, sports teams, children's camps and freshman orientation this summer.

One group, the CentriKid Training Week Program, has been using CU as their summer camp destination since 1990.

"They've told me the reason they return is because of the excellent customer service," Rusty Watkins, director of summer camps and conferences, said.

"I coordinate housing, meals, field space and facilities; it makes it easier for the groups to only have one contact person on campus. I have a great staff helping me to get everything done and organized."

Jeremy Echols, CentriKid camp coordinator, said they hold training week for the camp leaders across the country at CU.

"We return to Campbellsville University because we have a loyal group of church leaders who love camp on this campus and because the campus staff take great care of our camp staff and our church leaders. Rusty Watkins and his team always take care of the things we

need on campus, and they even think of things before we need them sometimes!

"The customer service provided by Rusty is the biggest reason we've never even thought of looking for a new place to train our staff," he said.

Echols said his favorite thing about Campbellsville is the feeling that no matter what comes up he knows that the needs of the group can be accommodated. That is not the case for all camp locations.

"We are on over 20 different campuses, and in some places we are treated like we just rent the facilities, but at Campbellsville, we are treated like partners."

In 2012, CentriKid will be at Campbellsville for the full summer. Echols said this is the first time they've been offered all eight weeks of camp (plus a weekend camp) at Campbellsville.

"We are happy for the opportunity to add more weeks of camp and touch the lives of more kids and adults through our partnership with Campbellsville University," he said.

CentriKid is a five-day, four-night camp for third to sixth graders to experience the time of their lives and learn

more about the message of Jesus Christ, Echols said.

The camps held over the summer included 22 sports camps, 12 of which were football camps. Eight of those used CU's facilities for the first time.

"The new Astroturf on the football field is an added bonus," Watkins said. "It has definitely increased participation."

Gulf Presbytery of the Reformed Presbyterian Church of North America Family Camp used the CU campus for the first time this summer as well. This is the first family camp that CU has hosted.

Campbellsville also hosted its own camps, LINC Freshman Orientation, Kids College, Children's Theater Camp and a Dental Workshop.

Kids College offers courses in such categories as: Mad Scientist, CSI—Cool Science Investigations, Cookin' Up a Storm, American Girl Through the Seasons, Lights, Stage, Action and Photography 101.

Kids College is offered to students in third to eighth grade.

The Dental Workshop was an idea of Dr. Dwayne Frazier, associate vice president for academic affairs. The workshop was a chance for students to practice working with crowns, fillings and other situations on volunteers.

Campbellsville University to host Kentucky Political Science Association annual meeting; John Chowning elected president

Campbellsville University will host the 2012 annual conference of the Kentucky Political Science Association, which will be held on March 2-3, 2012. John Chowning will preside at that meeting.

Chowning, vice president for church and external relations and executive assistant to the president, was recently elected president of the statewide organization comprised of professionals in the field of political science.

The group hosts an annual conference at which papers are presented by undergraduate students, graduate students, and professors at various institutions, and discussions are held on a wide range of political science topics.

Chowning said, "I am honored to serve as president for 2011-2012 for the Kentucky Political Science Association. This is a great opportunity for Campbellsville University and for our faculty and students. We look forward to hosting the March 2-3, 2012 KPSA conference, and detailed planning and preparation are already under way."

Chowning teaches political science classes periodically at CU and was the founder of Campbellsville University's Kentucky Heartland Institute on Public Policy, an organization that facilitates public policy study and issues debate, while encouraging the involvement of Christian leaders in the public and civic arenas.

He has also been appointed to a committee on equity to review the status of diversity and equity in Kentucky's educational system.

At the last KPSA conference at Western Kentucky University, Chowning served as the moderator/chair of two sessions at which papers were presented by undergraduate students from various colleges and universities from around Kentucky.

Carwile holds a master's degree in theology from CU and was recipient of the Campbellsville University Leadership Award in 2010.

"Get it done!" was the message from Carwile. He congratulated the graduates who received master's degrees in theology and said, "Now go on and get your doctorate, never mind how hard, just get it done."

He told the graduates if they were finishing their bachelor's degrees and thinking how much time it might take to get a master's degree, "get it done."

Basing his presentation on John 13, he advised everyone to continue in their servant leadership development by "taking up a towel along the way, occasionally washing someone's feet," and, he said, "what may be even harder for you, allow someone to wash yours."

Carwile ended with encouragement for future students who might be considering college. "When I was a student at CU-Louisville, we got to know each other and became family in the small class sizes. I am glad to be part of this Campbellsville family and urge others to join as well."

The first Servant Leadership Awards were presented for academic excellence and servant leadership. A pottery basin, pitcher and towel gift were presented to three graduates: Wendy Stout of Mt. Washington, Ky., for organizational management and leadership in the classroom; Rachel Heyne of Louisville for having a 4.0 GPA in Christian Social Ministry; and to Angeliq Barker of Louisville who had a 3.8 GPA in Christian Social Ministry.

Dr. Keith Spears, CU vice president for regional and professional education, welcomed the crowd of over 100 graduates and their families to the luau-style celebration and dinner.

A Hawaiian theme was supported by two skits with Dr. Darlene Eastridge, dean of the Carver School of Social Work and Counseling, as the Ukulele Lady, who was accompanied by Carwile.

Campbellsville University's Church Relations Council (CRC) is a primary constituency organization providing support for the Christian higher education mission of the university.

In its 35th year, the council serves in an advisory capacity to the president and administration in maintaining closer relations between CU and area churches.

"The Church Relations Council remains an important link in connecting Campbellsville University to the local church and in helping fulfill CU's commitment to providing a Christ-centered higher education experience in the Baptist tradition," according to Rev. John Chowning, vice president for church and external relations, who oversees the CRC.

"Because of the strong network provided by the Church Relations Council, CU remains very much a church-connected university."

Dennis Bickers, Southeast Area Resource Minister for American Baptist Churches of Indiana and Kentucky, has served as chair of the CRC and has also served on the executive committee. He said, "It has been fascinating to watch the growth of Campbellsville University during my time on the CRC and to see the positive impact the CRC has had on the university.

"Not only has the CRC provided financial support to CU, we have been involved in helping recruit students and in prayer support. We have also provided numerous suggestions to the faculty and trustees that have been incorporated into the life of the university, helping it have an even greater impact on the students who are pursuing Christian higher education."

The CRC has helped raise hundreds of thousands of dollars for CU, especially during the Centennial Capital Campaign. Chowning said, "For more than three decades, the Church Relations Council has provided tremendous support for Campbellsville University."

Helen Franklin Henderson, secretary of the CRC, said they support CU with "prayers, offerings, suggestions and encouragement."

Bickers said, "I am convinced that Campbellsville University will continue its growth and impact on young people, and I further believe that the CRC will continue to have an important role in that growth."

Established in 1978, the group meets twice annually while the CRC Executive Committee meets more regularly with the administration.

Campbellsville University hosts 400th anniversary of King James Bible in September, October

Campbellsville University will host a celebration for the 400 year anniversary of the King James Bible. There will be three evenings of celebration as well as a morning chapel service.

In 1611, after years of translating and revising previous versions of the English Bible, a version authorized by King James I of England and King James VI of Scotland was published. This version became the standard for people and Protestant Christians in the English speaking world.

"As a child, it was in the language of the King James Bible that I memorized the Lord's Prayer," said Dr. Glen Taul, Campbellsville University's archivist for the Montgomery Library and co-chair of the 400th anniversary observance of its publica-

tion. "It is still the way I recite the prayer whenever it is collectively said in worship services."

The celebration begins Thursday, Sept. 22 at 7 p.m. in the Ransdell Chapel. Guest speakers will be Larry Kreitzer from Regent's Park College, Oxford University, Oxford; and Deborah Rooke, Regent's Park College, Oxford University.

It continues on Thursday, Oct. 6 at 7 p.m. in the Banquet Hall of the Badgett Academic Support Center. CU's Dr. Bob Doty, professor emeritus of English, and Taul will be speaking.

On Thursday, Oct. 13 at 7 p.m. in the Banquet Hall of the Badgett Academic Support Center the speakers will be CU's Dr. Shawn Williams, assistant professor of political science,

and Dr. John Hurtgen, dean of the School of Theology and professor.

The celebration will come to a close on Wednesday, Oct. 19 at 10 a.m. with a chapel service in the Ransdell Chapel. A short reception will follow.

"This year's events are occurring around the world to celebrate the 400th anniversary of the publication of the Authorized Version (King James Bible)," Taul said. "Campbellsville University, with homage to its Christian traditions, thought it important to observe this landmark anniversary by sponsoring lectures, musical events and exhibits this fall semester."

A Kentucky photographer captured Kennedy in Dallas

Steve Mitchell (a '67), then 23, peered into his Miranda D camera with its 105 mm lens, eagerly waiting for the motorcade to pass him with the young, popular president.

The big presidential limousine, a midnight blue 1961 Lincoln, took a winding 11-mile route through Dallas on the warm November Friday with President John F. Kennedy and his wife, Jackie, in the back seat, greeting the throng.

"CLICK" went Mitchell's camera as the motorcade, about 40 to 50 feet away and traveling about 35 mph, drove past.

The Kentuckian's photo captured a relaxed president with tousled hair and a slight smile, and a first lady demurely waving her gloved left hand as confetti rained down.

Texas Gov. John Connally, riding in the front with his wife, Nellie, is looking up, perhaps, Mitchell thinks, looking at the photographer and his young cousin, who wore a JFK mask to honor the president.

About 30 seconds later, Mitchell figures, the motorcade reached Dealy Plaza and the history books.

It passed the Texas School Book Depository Building, where Lee Harvey Oswald perched on the sixth floor with a rifle that mortally wounded the president.

"When Nov. 22 rolls around, you can't help but think about that day in 1963," Mitchell said Monday at his home in rural Shelby County near Waddy.

"It's been 47 years since the Kennedy assassination. People used to ask where you were on that day. Now they ask if you were alive that day. I was, and I'll never forget it."

Mitchell is 70. He retired in 2000 as a state employee who photographed the administrations of eight Kentucky governors, their families and famous people who visited them.

His portfolio includes more than 10,000 photos from the days of Gov. Louie Nunn in 1968 to Gov. Paul Patton in 2000.

But Mitchell's most historic photo was taken that day in Dallas.

Raised in Green County in south-central Kentucky, Mitchell, an only child, had come to Dallas with his mother, Ruth, for a Thanksgiving visit with his aunt and uncle, Wilma and Horace Goodrich, and their 12-year-old son, Timothy. Mitchell's father, Paul, stayed at home in Kentucky to run the family hardware and appliance store in Greensburg.

Horace Goodrich was an attorney with an office in downtown Dallas. On the morning of Nov. 22, 1963, he informed his visitors the president was going to be in town and wondered aloud if they wanted to see him.

"Being a country boy from Kentucky, I said sure," said Mitchell. "I wanted to see the president and maybe get a picture of him. I was what you would call a budding photographer."

Mitchell and his family drove to Goodrich's law office and parked in a nearby lot.

"My uncle's office was on the first floor of a bank building," Mitchell said. "He had gotten permission to go to his office, as he did practically every day, and none of us were checked by anyone."

A window in the office fronted the street where the presidential motorcade would pass. Mitchell and his cousin climbed on a ladder to an outside ledge above the window so they could stand and see over the heads of the well-wishers.


"People wanted to touch the president. It was Camelot. After I got the picture, we went back inside the office, and then I took a picture of my uncle," Mitchell said.

"We didn't know what was going on. My mother always claimed she heard the shots, but I don't know about that."

When the family members got back to the parking lot, they saw an attendant crying.

"He said, 'The president's been shot. He's been shot three times, and they've taken him to Parkland Hospital,' that's the first we had heard about it."

His uncle's car radio informed Mitchell and his family that the 35th president of the United States had died at the age of 46 of gunshot wounds.

"For the rest of the weekend, we watched TV and listened to the radio. Nobody wanted to do anything."

Thanksgiving fell on Nov. 28 that year. On the following Monday, Mitchell and his mother drove back to Kentucky. He couldn't wait to develop his film at a home lab.

"I was relieved and disappointed at the same time when I first saw the photo," Mitchell said.

"I was relieved that I got a photo of the president but disappointed that Kennedy's face was not razor sharp. It's slightly out of focus, but I was young, and the motorcade was speeding along."

The photo was first published in his student newspaper at Campbellville College. A few weeks later, the *Campbellville News Journal* used it.

No historian or police official ever asked him about it.

Mitchell acknowledges it's still emotional for him to look at the photo.

He sees it today and thinks about how promising the future looked for him and the nation.

Every day at home, Mitchell passes an 11-by-14 print of the photo he has hanging in a hallway.

"We all were so young then," he said.

but catch a glimpse of the opportunities and resources that will be available to them.



Long hours and many deadlines have paid off for Campbellsville University's Jeannie Clark, director and producer for WLCU-TV. Clark was named the Mid-South Conference Media Person of the Year on June 1 during the conference's annual meetings at Georgetown College. The award is voted on by MSC sports information directors.

"I am honored and very appreciative for even being nominated for something like this. I did not see it coming," Clark said. "I enjoy working with sports and love the challenge it presents because it's spontaneous and you never see the same thing twice. Athletics is a great platform to promote Campbellsville University."

During the past year, Clark directed, produced and edited weekly television

shows, including the "Perry Thomas Show" and "Inside CU Sports" for local programming in Campbellsville and statewide programming on the Wazoo Sports Network. She also has served as director/producer for live television broadcasts of home football games and home MSC basketball games on Campbellsville's WLCU-TV, which is broadcast on Comcast Cable channel 10 and streamed online.

In addition, Clark helped provide service and equipment to stream each game of the 2010 and 2011 Mid-South Conference Baseball Tournament online. And on April 6, 2011, she produced the first-ever live televised baseball game from Campbellsville's Tiger Field.

"Jeannie is the most energetic director or producer with whom I have

ever worked," said Dr. Keith Spears, vice president for regional and professional development. "She is filled with ideas and cares not who gets the credit, just that it is professionally accomplished and represents the medium well."

In addition to her athletics work, Clark has served as director/producer for WLCU-TV regular shows such as John Chowning's "Dialogue on Public Issues," Al Hardy's "People, Places and Things" and Taylor Regional Hospital's "Let's Talk Health." WLCU-TV also broadcasts live chapel services, FIRST CLASS sessions and commencement ceremonies.

Clark, along with director of broadcast Services Jim Wooley and WLCU student workers often video other special events for archival purposes, special projects or commercials.

"Jeannie is very deserving of the award and is a dedicated professional," Wooley said.

Clark was unable to attend the MSC meeting June 1 because she was helping to produce a live one-hour program in Louisville, which featured Campbellsville University on "WAVE 3 Listens," a morning talk show on Louisville's NBC affiliate station.

WLCU-TV includes Comcast Cable channel 10 and Comcast Cable channel 22, which serves as an information channel for the Taylor County community. Also, the new WLCU 88.7 FM radio station became part of Campbellsville's Broadcast Services in March 2011.

This is the second year a television professional has been named MSC Media Person of the Year, as the WYMT sports staff in Hazard, Ky., and the Wazoo Sports Network shared the honor in 2010.

Danis, who will graduate in December 2011, will student teach at Marion County High School for the fall semester. While she plans to become a math teacher eventually, she's not sure where she will end up after graduation as she may take the opportunity to go overseas and do missions.

"Eventually I want to be a teacher in the classroom, but I don't have to be there all the time...I could see myself working with a non profit."

Danis' dream job is to work with high school youth, "empowering them through leadership and ministry opportunities to really be the people they are and not get caught up in the world's view of who they should be."

When she came to CU, she connected to students through Baptist Campus Ministry, but after a while

found it hard to attend with her schedule. She and other friends felt "a burden to minister to athletes." This was the vision and start of the Crazy Love Bible study for athletic teams.

"God totally took it from there," she said. "He took a small Bible study and made it campus wide."

In a recent Champions of Character video, Danis said, "Champions of Character isn't about getting the most rebounds...it's what you do outside your sporting event. Student-athletes have a great influence on campus, and we can choose to use that ability to do service, be service-minded and give back to the campus and community."

Whitney Ballinger, a teammate of Danis, helped nominate her for the 2011 Dr. Leroy Walker Champions of Character Award. In her nominations she wrote, "On our team, it is a running joke that Courtney is our 'mother hen.' As the oldest of six children, Courtney has a mothering instinct. She takes care of us all. She is always willing to sacrifice her time, her energy or her efforts for someone else ... She is honestly the heart and soul of our team."

England introduces children to sports, God

**“Whatever your task, work heartily,
as serving the Lord and not men.”**

— *Colossians 3:23*

Jason England graduated from Campbellsville University in 2004 with a degree in sports ministry but fought with himself for three years before eventually doing what he said God called him to do.

“I ran from it,” England said about the formation of Audience 1, a faith-based sports camp designed to introduce children to the basics of sports and the Word of God. “I knew what I was supposed to do, but I didn’t know how to go about it. I thought it would go away, but it never did.”

So, in 2007—armed with nothing but a willingness to spread the Gospel—England used the knowledge he gained at CU and as a high school and college soccer coach and waltzed into the unknown.

“I knew I loved sports, but I also noticed that sports seemed to be pushing away from the church,”

England said. “I saw a need for people to hear the Gospel in a way that would be unique to them.”

Although his major emphasis is for children ages 5-12, he also holds camps for 3 and 4 year olds and the 13-18 age group.

Some say the quickest way to a man’s heart is through his stomach. But England found that finding the hearts of parents is most quickly gained through their children.

“Generally speaking, whatever children do their parents will follow,” he said. “And that’s one of our major focuses. We present a message in a way that a child can understand. And that makes it easy for the parent as well.”

So, even though he deals mostly with children ... Audience 1 is, in reality, a family ministry.

England is associate pastor and student minister at Saloma Baptist

Church. He and his wife, Emily Chowning England (also a 2004 CU graduate), have two children of their own, Haley and Kenzi.

England became the assistant director of alumni relations at CU Aug. 15.

“My public job gives me the financial base I need to raise my family. The sports camps are a ministry for now.”

England hasn’t given up hope that his sports ministry can eventually evolve into his primary job. Right now participants pay a camp fee and he solicits sponsors. The fee helps supply T-shirts and other supplies. He teaches a Bible memory verse each camp, and the children can recite that verse to the sponsoring businesses and get a free drink or a dessert.

The work model is pretty simple. Camps are offered in tennis, soccer, baseball and softball, according to England.

“There is a definite buzz about what we’re doing,” said England. “But there are also a lot of people still looking from the outside.”

England has toyed with about every aspect of camps and now holds them predominantly in the evenings and on weekends—times that families can share experiences.

England teaches children the basics of sports, allowing them to form a good foundation in technique and then, of course, a spiritual message that will focus them on doing things for Christ and not so much for their peers.

“Through sports we’re able to bring in people who may never go to church,” England said. “We may live in the Bible Belt, but sadly we have a high number (about 50 percent) who don’t go to church.”

So, the message is...God needs a bigger audience. England thinks he’s figured out the format.

NACDA names Hollingsworth NAIA Southeast AD of Year

For the second straight year an Athletic Director of the Year honor was bestowed upon Campbellsville University Athletics Director Rusty Hollingsworth. The National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) recognized Hollingsworth as the NACDA Under Armour AD of the Year for the NAIA Southeast region during the NACDA's 46th Annual Convention.

Hollingsworth, who was named the Mid-South Conference AD of the Year in 2004 and 2010, is one of four recipients of the NACDA award in the NAIA. A total of 28 regional awards are given across all college athletic divisions.

"It's always nice to be honored by your peers with an award like this. I share this with everyone who works in our department, the administration that

supports our efforts and the entire campus community. I feel very blessed to have the opportunity to work in an environment that fosters the development of character like Campbellsville University does. It is enjoyable to come to work every day with a group of coaches that care about the well being of their student-athletes," Hollingsworth said.

"I would also like to express my thanks to NACDA and Under Armour for selecting me to be a recipient of this award."

Under his leadership in 2010-11, Campbellsville won six Mid-South Conference championships to claim the President's Cup for the second-straight year as the MSC's top athletic program. Also in 2010-11, CU sent 19 of its 23 sports programs to a national postseason.

In addition to success on the field, Campbellsville was honored as a Five Star Champions of Character program by the NAIA and had both its football and women's basketball teams receive the NAIA Champion of Character Team Award in 2010.

In 2009-10, the athletics department raised \$1.2 million for facility upgrades. The "More Than a Game" campaign was such a success the financial goal was increased to \$2 million in September 2010 for further growth of CU's facilities.

During Hollingsworth's 10 years at CU, the athletics department has constructed three new facilities and provided lighting for three of its outdoor sports. He has also helped grow the athletics department in number of student-athletes, coaches and teams through the reinstatement or creation of eight sports programs.

"All of us at Campbellsville University are very proud of Rusty Hollingsworth and extend our congratulations to him on receiving the athletic director of the year award for the southeast region of the United States," said Dr. Michael V. Carter, university president.

"This is further confirmation of what we know—that Rusty is a hard worker who is dedicated to our goal of developing a nationally competitive intercollegiate athletic program for our student-athletes. He has assembled a talented team of coaches who are working to develop competitive teams comprised of young men and women of character."

Hollingsworth also serves on the NAIA Rules and Rating committee and previously served four years as the NAIA Region XI chair. He was on the initial Champions of Character committee and has served two terms as the chair of the Mid-South Conference athletic directors.

Former Tiger pitcher signs with Kansas City Royals

Former Campbellville University pitcher Brian Edelen inked a non-drafted free agent deal with the Kansas City Royals in June. He made his professional debut with the Arizona League (AZL) Royals as a relief pitcher June 23 in a game against the AZL Cubs.

Edelen, a 6-foot-1 right-handed pitcher from Fisherville, Ky., played his freshman and sophomore years at Campbellville in 2007 and 2008 before transferring to Western Kentucky University.

During his time with the Tigers, Edelen posted a 10-5 record over two seasons in 94 2/3 innings pitched. As a freshman in 2007, he appeared in 17 games and was 7-2 with eight starts. During his sophomore campaign in 2008, Edelen was 3-3 with a 4.17 ERA. He struck out 43 and walked nine in 41 innings pitched, while holding opponents to a .256 batting average.

"Brian left us after two years due to his academic major. We had a great relationship and he was a contributor as a pitcher for two years through buying into the principles of our program. We always felt that he could develop into

someone with a legit chance at the next level," CU head coach Beauford Sanders said.

"He is a fine young person and comes from a great family. His mother, Jeanie, and father, Mike, are super nice. I am very pleased about this news and wish him every success."

Edelen becomes the fourth former Tiger, and first CU pitcher, to play for a Major League Baseball franchise.

He is the third former CU player to sign a free agent deal in the past three years. CU third baseman Chris Curley, a former teammate of Edelen's, signed with the Atlanta Braves in 2009, while Tiger catcher Richie Rowland signed with the Arizona Diamondbacks in 2010.

Donnie Richardson is the Tigers' only MLB Draft pick, selected by the Chicago Cubs in 1983.
