We have hosted 7,100 young people attending a series of camps and conferences on the campus, representing 14 states. There have been over 150 decisions for salvation made and an additional 70 rededications and other decisions as of July 13. And we have been busy with fundraising, getting ready for the influx of new and returning students for the fall 2012 semester, and preparing for an exciting fall athletic season including the CU Fighting Tigers football team 25th anniversary.


With the advent of the fall 2012 semester, enrollment looks very strong. A new men's Village residence hall has just been completed that will enable another 48 students to live on campus. Work has begun on the Alumni and Friends Park to be located on the corner of Broadway and North Columbia Avenue.

Fundraising is ongoing for a number of key projects, including the Alumni and Friends Park; business school building; new wellness center; gymnasium and academic space next to the Gosser Gymnasium; art village complex; increasing CU's endowment, and, as always, the Scholarship Fund, which makes a CU education affordable to deserving students with financial needs. Opportunities for student-athletes is expanding this fall with a new men's swimming team and several new junior varsity athletic teams. Every month, Dr. Doug Feltner, a Campbellsville University Board of Trustees member from Green County, along with his wife, Barbara, and daughter, Kelsey, an incoming CU freshman, pack their car with medical supplies and travel to Beattyville, Ky., for a weekend.

Their son, Matt, a podiatry resident who graduated from CU in 2008, often accompanies them.

The Feltners are part of Kentucky Mountain Mission, founded in 1942 and which reaches the people of Eastern Kentucky through its church camp programs, pastoring of local churches and school ministries. The mission organized volunteer dentists and physicians to serve patients free of charge.

“Our resources are limited,” Feltner said, “but we never turn away any patient. We see adults and children with many different medical problems, including acute and chronic issues. We perform office surgeries as well. The patients that we treat are so gracious. It is a pleasure to treat them.”

In addition to free visits, they provide sample medications or refer patients to indigent drug programs sponsored by pharmaceutical companies in many instances.

Feltner said he sees a repeating story in the patients of no insurance and no reserve funds to pay for medical care.

A 2008 Algernon Sydney Sullivan Award winner from Campbellsville University, Feltner said there are times in the free clinics that he feels inadequate. He said different ailments are common, but some stick with him.

“One family that we see regularly has a beautiful 8-year-old child that was recently diagnosed with a brain tumor. I feel helpless that I cannot offer successful treatment,” he said.

“Even my words of sympathy are insufficient. I realize that these parents are heartbroken about their child’s illness. It is during times like these that I realize that the main purpose of this medical ministry is much more than medicines or surgeries. The defining question is, ‘Do they see Jesus in me?’”

Feltner said one of his favorite stories from the Bible is Luke 10:25-37. Jesus told about a man that had been beaten, robbed and left to die beside the road. Many saw him but never offered to help. Then, a man of different ethnicity saw him and immediately took time to help the man. He treated his wounds, took him to a shelter and paid for all costs involved. After telling this story, Jesus said, “Go and do likewise.”

Feltner said, “I feel a sense of truly making a difference in the lives of these patients when providing free care. Our volunteers share the common idea that health care is a ‘right’ not a ‘privilege.’ No one should have to choose between buying food or paying for health care.” ❁

“Once that had been accomplished, our next step was to launch the MSW program and to work hard in securing accreditation for the MSW. Dean Darlene Eastridge and the Carver School faculty have worked very hard to reach this important step in the accrediting process, and we believe that the Carver School of Social Work, as it has grown and matured at Campbellsville University since 1998, is stronger than ever in its rich history of preparing Christian social workers.”

DAVID HARRISON COMPLETES DIPLOMA AFTER 13 YEARS IN THE PROS

He shattered records and ignited crowds from 1997 to 1999, but David Harrison's greatest achievement as a Campbellsville Tiger came May 5, 2012, by way of a fulfilled promise to his mother.

With a packed Powell Athletic Center watching, the 6-foot-3 former CU men's basketball guard walked across the stage to receive his diploma, 13 years after walking away from school with only a few hours remaining toward a degree in business.

"I made a mistake and quit going to school. I left and went back to Louisville and said 'Forget school, I'm about to be in the NBA,'" said Harrison, who scored 1,052 points in two seasons, including 60 in one game.

His NBA break never came, although he was close numerous times. Harrison put together a 13-year international career, playing in more than 10 countries. He had multiple stints in the Continental Basketball Association (CBA), including one as the league's leading scorer.

While playing in Colombia in the spring of 2011, he decided it was time to finish what he started at CU. He learned about CU's Louisville Education Center from Tiger head coach Keith Adkins, who was assistant coach for Travis Ford during Harrison's tenure.

"I knew having a professional basketball career wouldn't last forever. As much as I'd like it to. With today's times and how the economy is, I knew I had to finish my degree," Harrison said.

Once connected with the LEC staff, he chose to complete his degree with a bachelor of science in organizational leadership. After being a leader of teams across the world, Harrison saw the degree helpful for his future hopes of coaching at the collegiate level.

"It's a great story of dedication and perseverance... Dave has always been a really solid person—a good guy, great teammate and great player. Dave has persevered and dedicated himself to being the student part of a student-athlete now. He's going to move on and be successful in anything that he does," said Adkins, who says degree completion is the number one thing he sells during student-athlete recruitment.

"We're going to give them an opportunity to get a degree...not just use them for basketball and send them on their way."

Harrison says going back to school would have been difficult if not for the LEC and support from his classmates and professors.

"Campbellsville really supports you. I didn't realize that when I was going to school there. I was a knucklehead," said Harrison. "Everyone at Campbellsville, there on campus and here in Louisville, are working together. They want people to succeed."

On graduation day, Harrison sat in his chair near the 3-point line. To his right, the baseball team used to rock the bleachers cheering for him. He wasn't the only one remembering his glory days though.

"One Thousand Point Club," said Kevin Propes ('98), CU assistant dean of academic support and former Tiger Pep Band member. "I remember a lot of highlight dunks you had at this end of the floor."

The words brought a smile to Harrison's face, and nearly tears, as he walked toward the goal to receive his diploma. His mother, father and grandmother watched from the stands just as they did for every Tiger home game more than a decade ago.

"I made a promise to [my mom] I'd get my degree," said Harrison. "Now she can say her only child is a college graduate." 🐾

Campbellsville University delegation says ‘thank you’ to legislators in Frankfort

Kentucky Gov. Steve Beshear welcomed Campbellsville University students and leaders at the State Capitol, Feb. 22. The CU delegation made the trip to say “thank you” and affirm the efforts of Kentucky’s legislators to continue financial aid support of students like the three represented.

On the trip from CU were President Michael V. Carter, Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Frank Cheatham, and Vice President for Church and External Relations and Executive Assistant to the President John Chowning. They were accompanied by three CU School of Education juniors: Courtney Claywell from Albany, Ky.; Lauren Goodin from Columbia, Ky.; and Zach Smith from Russell Springs, Ky.

In answer to legislator’s questions about what is being done to make a college education more affordable, Carter said the KEES Matching Scholarship Program is a primary example of how CU is adding value to state financial aid programs. In this 2012-13 academic year, CU has expanded its KEES Matching Scholarship Program to \$1,500 for students in 14 core counties in CU’s service area: Taylor, Green, Adair, Marion, Casey, Russell, LaRue, Hardin, Pulaski, Cumberland, Hart, Metcalfe, Nelson and Washington.

Carter said, “We’re one of the lowest anywhere on annual increases, and we work daily doing everything we can do to contain costs. We have consolidated personnel positions, asked present

employees to be more efficient, and we are extremely careful in the way we spend our capital dollars.”

He added that CU is taking green initiatives seriously, making sure with every added structure that all have smart utility controls to cut off or cut down usage when there is low or no activity. Students were introduced in the offices of the state’s leaders, starting with that of Gov. Beshear. Teaching moments occurred throughout the day as Goodin, Smith and Claywell observed activity on the floor of the House. Some of the best moments came when state government was reflected through the eyes of CU alumni who are now working in the Capitol. ♡

Heath writes book for new families

Chandra Heath is a licensed marriage and family therapist at Associates in Pediatric Therapy in Shelbyville, Ky.

She wrote a book in October 2011, titled *Pre-Parental Workbook*, about preparing yourself, your relationship and your family for having a baby. It has been translated in Spanish.

She graduated from CU in 2007 with a master of arts in counseling with a focus on marriage and the family after completing a bachelor of science in Christian social ministries from CU in 2002.

It all started with a Campbellsville University pencil.

Chandra Mamie was an attendee at a youth evangelism rally in Ohio. She got a CU pencil, along with one from another school, and she toured CU and found a “peace” there.

She didn’t grow up with Christian friends, but she felt God was leading her to be at CU, where she would find those friends for life.

At CU, she remembers Dr. John Hurtgen playing his guitar in a religion class. She remembers Dr. Susan Howell,

Dr. Elaine David and Dr. Jeanette Parker, who showed her how you can bridge the compatibility of psychology and her Christian faith.

“They didn’t treat me as just a student,” she said. “They talked to me about what was going on in my life. They really cared about me.”

She met Dr. Scott Wigginton in graduate school, and she said he showed her about Christianity and therapy.

He said of her book: “This simple tool will help couples move beyond reaction to reflection; it should be a conversation waiting to happen for serious parents!”

Heath said “technology is tearing apart families,” emotional needs are not being met, and people aren’t communicating with each other.

She said she works with a lot of families on coping skills—how to do the skills and how to hold each other accountable.

She and her husband, Jeremiah, have two children: a son, Atreyu, and a daughter, Amara. She can be reached at info@chandraheath.com for questions about her book and for speaking engagements.

“My education received from the Carver School of Social Work and Counseling has been priceless,” she said.

She said the professors at CU went beyond being teachers and became mentors, and to this day she can call and ask questions.

Heath said she was always challenged at CU and encouraged to find out what you believe. “I have a big heart for CU. My world was rocked in a good way by CU, and I want to help shape somebody from my university.” 🐾

CU establishes veterans club; alumni encouraged to become involved

Always prepared to serve. Semper Paratus Servire, Campbellsville University's newly established veterans club, is prepared to serve returning veterans looking to further their education, local veterans in need of help and serve as a regional resource for veterans affairs.

"The club members have set very lofty goals for themselves and realize that they will need the help of alumni and many others in the community," said Dr. Roscoe Bowen, associate professor of exercise science, is faculty adviser for the club. Bowen, who served in the Army, said, "Regardless, this is our mission, and we invite any and all who wish to help us climb this mountain."

Bowen said the club intends to provide academic support, and assistance in accessing veterans' benefits, as well as camaraderie to students who have or continue to serve in the armed forces. Semper Paratus Servire is a service organization whose

members aim to help veterans transition from military service to academic life.

The club builds on CU's mission of developing servant leaders. "Veterans returning from any era of conflict come to universities with much more complex issues and challenges due to their experiences than traditional students," Bowen said.

"The club also exposes CU's students to those who have given much of themselves in the service of our nation by putting faces to that sacrifice."

Alumni and community members are encouraged to volunteer with the club,

although membership is reserved for CU students, faculty and staff having served in the military.

Alumni & Friends Park to 'ENHANCE the



FRONT DOOR' of Campbellsville University

Campbellsville University will soon have a new “front door.”

The fundraising has begun for the Alumni & Friends Park, which will be located at the corner of North Columbia Avenue and Broadway.

Benji Kelly, vice president for development, said, “The Alumni & Friends Park is envisioned as a gathering place for students, faculty, staff, alumni and friends.”

He said the project will cost approximately \$250,000 with \$137,000 having been raised at this point.

Dr. Michael V. Carter said the new park will “enhance the entrance of Campbellsville University along Broadway and allow alumni and friends to be memorialized and remembered forever.”

Giving levels and naming opportunities have been established ranging from \$100 for a small 4x8 paver to a standing column for \$50,000. Other amounts include: a water fountain for \$25,000; a full garden (including a walkway, a bench and scripture) for \$25,000; a garden pathway for \$10,000; a tree canopy walkway for \$10,000; a light pole for \$5,000; a round bench (located in the Scripture Garden) for \$5,000; a scripture plaque for \$2,500; a floral garden for \$1,500 (per year); a bench for \$1,000; a tree for \$750; a wall plaque for \$500; a medium paver for \$250 and a small paver for \$100.

Other projects CU is working on are pictured on the left. They include a wellness center, an athletic/wrestling annex, the School of Business and Economics, an art park and village, and an additional nursing building.

The summer of 2012 has been a record for Campbellsville University students studying abroad. Students are doing internships, taking classes, teaching English and more. Read some of their experiences:

Malaysia: Jordan Johnson, a senior of Russellville, Ky., studied abroad this summer as an intern with the U.S. Department of State at the U.S. Embassy in Malaysia.

Johnson chose Malaysia because she used to live in Southeast Asia when her parents were missionaries with the International Mission Board. “I really enjoyed the people and culture when I was young and wanted to come back and experience it now that I am older,” Johnson said.

Johnson recommends studying abroad because “you will not only learn more about that culture and its people, but you will find yourself to be more accepting of cultures that differ from yours.”

Austria: Kelsey Best and Kaylynn Best, seniors of Harrodsburg, Ky., and **Mindy Lowery**, a senior of Louisville, Ky., studied abroad in Bregenz, Austria this summer.

While still on the trip, Lowery, a business management major, said, “Studying abroad is a once-in-a-lifetime experience that I may never be blessed with again. I don’t only learn in a classroom but by pure immersion in a new culture... Studying abroad opens your eyes and broadens your views on life.”

Twin sisters Kaylynn and Kelsey said studying abroad gave them a chance to travel an area they’ve always wanted to see. Kaylynn, a social studies major, said she wanted to earn college credit this summer.

“I couldn’t think of a better way than to study abroad,” Kaylynn said. “When I become a social studies teacher, I will be able to share my knowledge and experiences with my students.”

Students also traveled on the weekends to Germany, France, Vienna and Italy.



CU wins seven NCCAA titles

In 2011-12, Campbellsville University more than doubled its number of championships in the National Christian College Athletic Association (NCCAA).

Entering its fourth season as a member of the NCCAA, Campbellsville had three individual and one team national championship prior to August 2011. Since then, the Tigers and Lady Tigers have collected seven NCCAA championship banners and plaques, including five in track-and-field.

Following the Fighting Tiger football team's Victory Bowl title in November, CU sophomore PJ Randles claimed CU's first-ever indoor track and field championship, winning the triple jump competition with a jump of 13.94 meters.

Randles' female teammates followed with four national titles in early May at the NCCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships. Tiosha Beasley won

both the long jump and triple jump titles, while Nathelie Zetrenne won the 100-meter hurdles title and Tiana Benjamin won the javelin throw.

"From the track and field side of the NCCAA, winning a national title is very prestigious," said Joe Stockton, CU track coach. "The NCCAA Track-and-Field National Championship is set up for every school to participate in before going to their national championships, so the powerhouses from the NAIA, NCAA Division II and Division III are all in attendance during the weekend event."

Tiger tennis followed the historical May for CU by claiming its first-ever national title at the NCCAA Tennis Championships in Mobile, Ala., on May 11. CU men's tennis swept through its competition with a 5-0 week after falling in the national semifinals each of the previous two years.

"These seniors have been working hard for four years. You've really been able to see the progression of these guys and the program," Kyle Caven, CU tennis coach, said. "We have a lot of room to grow, but it's nice to achieve things and see some progress with a championship. The guys couldn't be happier for each other. It's been such a team commitment this whole year and week. They've come together and enjoyed it and really become better friends as well."

Campbellsville now has three team championships and eight individual national titles in the NCCAA to go along with six individual NAIA national championships.

Junior varsity teams expand at Campbellsville University

When student-athletes report in the fall there will be nearly 40 new spots open for team competition as Campbellsville University adds junior varsity programs in women's basketball, women's soccer, and men's and women's tennis.

"We are happy to provide our junior varsity programs to student-athletes looking for an opportunity to participate in their respective sport," said Rusty Hollingsworth, director of athletics.

CU already had approximately 150 students participating in junior varsity programs as baseball, football, men's basketball, men's soccer and volleyball

have had programs in place for several years.

Hollingsworth said it's important for CU to provide the newcomers a quality experience while they are a student-athlete at CU.

"It allows us to recruit new students that want to participate in the sport they love while earning a college degree," he said.

With the addition of the four new programs—three women's and one men's—the total number of junior varsity sports participants will approach 200. There were more than 600 varsity

student-athletes participating in 15 sports on 23 teams in 2011-12.

Thom Jones, coach of the women's soccer program, sees the additional women's sports as an opportunity.

"Having a JV program will give girls who aren't ready for varsity time to develop," said Jones. "They can work with the entire squad, learn my system, get physically stronger and also have some meaningful competition."

Keith Adkins, coach of the men's basketball team, knows something about offering opportunities.

This past season, Adkins had two players to move up from junior varsity to varsity, one playing some significant minutes.

"When we recruit athletes I think it's important to offer that opportunity," Adkins said. "We can't promise or guarantee them they will get to the varsity, but we always want to leave that door open."

"Some of the junior varsity players can really help in practice, compete and gain experience. We needed another point guard last season and we brought up Storrie Truitt. He was a valuable addition."

Another player, Jonas Bohm, a May graduate, arrived on campus four years ago with Adkins' belief that he would be a JV player as well.

"Jonas showed up and had a tremendous work ethic from the get-go. We could tell he had a ceiling potential-wise that he hadn't reached." Bohm worked his way into the starting rotation his senior campaign.

Nurturing a campus appreciation of nature, All-American wrestler launches student environmental group

As a 2008 freshman, Spencer Adams was looking for a place where he could momentarily escape college life and find peace and quiet. He desired to be in nature, away from campus, but settled for a shaded storm drain at the corner of North Columbia Avenue and University Drive.

Today, that space is CU's Log Cabin Park, developed over the past year by Adams' student-based organization Green Minds.

Green Minds was created to help clean up the community and promote environment-conscious thinking among CU students. Adams, a three-time NAIA All-American wrestler from Marion, Ohio, developed his vision in Dr. Richie Kessler's environment and man class.

"When Spencer first came to me with this idea, it was a pencil drawing on a piece of paper. He was tired of hearing of all of the environmental problems out there," Kessler said. "Here was an

instance where somebody was not complaining but actually working to build consensus and do something to make things better. I was all for that from the beginning."

With Kessler's advice, and help from his fellow wrestlers and other students, Adams was determined to start awareness on campus.

"I wanted other students to get in there and have a place where they can make their impact on campus. I wanted to establish that base for everyone," said Adams, a May graduate with a degree in environmental science.

Adams worked with Green Minds; Kessler; and Rob Roberts, CU director of grounds and landscape development, to transform that edge of campus into a state park likeness with a cedar-log gazebo and bridge where an Earth Day event was held in the spring.

After planting more than 60 species of native plants, three wildflower beds,

20 or so different shrubs and trees and multiple ferns, the park has become home to numerous types of birds, which frequent the park to sing to visitors.

"It's been completely transformed from what it was... It's like you're not even on campus but out at some far-away cabin," Adams said. "This is the only place on campus you can hear all of the birds. You don't (usually) get that in the middle of a city."

Wrestler Derek Alsip of Cincinnati, Ohio is taking over Green Minds. Alsip plans to give international students a chance to plant a vegetable garden on the land. He also wants to add hiking trips this fall and will continue building benches out of cedar logs. The organization has already sold many benches to pay for additional plants at the park.

"I don't think you could have done this at any other university," Alsip said. "The university provided us this opportunity."

The **women's soccer** alumni scrimmage on Aug. 19 at 2 p.m. will kick off the schedule at Finley Stadium with the Lady Tigers' first regular season game being Friday, Aug. 30. **Men's soccer** and **football** will each play at home on Saturday, Sept. 1 to start their home schedules. **Volleyball** will open its season earlier in the week with back-to-back home games at 7 p.m. on Aug. 28 and Aug. 30.

Golf, cross country and **bowling** will also be in action this fall with the golf programs hosting its annual Don Bishop Invitational at the Campbellsville Country Club, Sept. 17-18, and the bowling programs will extend its annual Green River Classic to a two-day event, Sept. 29-30.

The winter seasons will begin Oct. 29 with Campbellsville **men's basketball** traveling to Western Kentucky University to compete in a preseason exhibition for the third time in the past five seasons.

Winter Rewind

Tiger Wrestling had its best postseason in team history. CU won its third-straight MSC title before winning the NAIA East Region Tournament. Franky James was named the MSC Coach of the Year.

Tiger Basketball finished its season with a 21-12 record after advancing to the first round of the NAIA National Tournament. CU finished the MSC season in sixth place.

Lady Tiger Basketball finished its season with a 20-13 record after advancing to the first round of the NAIA National Tournament. CU finished the MSC season in fourth place.

Tiger Cheerleading won its fourth MSC championship. CU hosted the NAIA East Regional and earned a Silver Bid to the second-annual NAIA Invitational as part of the National Cheer and Dance Collegiate Championships. Vanessa Adkins was named the MSC Coach of the Year.

For the first time in program history, both the **men's and women's bowling** teams advanced to the USBC Collegiate Sectionals. Both teams also competed in the NAIA Invitational.

Women's Swimming sent five swimmers to the NAIA Championships in March to compete in four relays and one individual event. Each CU swimmer set personal-best times in the meet.

A look back at spring

Lady Tiger Softball fell from first to fourth in the MSC, but responded to finish runner-up in the MSC Tournament. They went on to compete in the NCCAA Tournament, advancing to the national championship.

Lady Tiger Track and Field picked up its first NAIA All-American in both the indoor and outdoor championships. Women's outdoor track and field claimed four NCCAA national individual titles, while men's indoor track-and-field claimed the program's first national title.

CU Tennis finished the season ranking No. 17 in the NAIA for the men's and women's programs. Both teams advanced to the NCCAA National Tournament; the women finished in the semifinals and the men claimed their first national title. Kyle Caven was named the NCCAA Men's Tennis National Coach of the Year and MSC Men's and Women's Coach of the Year.

Tiger Baseball started the year with a nine-game winning streak and finished with a 37-18 mark after appearing in the NAIA Opening Round Tournament. CU finished third in the MSC standings.

Tiger and Lady Tiger Golf each finished third in the MSC Spring Tournament in April. Tiger junior Trey Shirley finished as an All-MSC golfer in the spring along with junior Scott Foster.
