
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

Campbellsville University groundbreaking leaves mark in university history

“Our dreams are now a reality” was a phrase commonly heard among attendants at the April 26 groundbreaking ceremony for the E. Bruce Heilman Student Center Complex at Campbellsville University. In President Michael V. Carter’s opening remarks, he quoted the Apostle Paul: “As we therefore have opportunity, let us do good for all people.” Carter said the new student center represents a commitment for the good of all people.

The \$5.5 million facility was named for Dr. E. Bruce Heilman, a CU trustee, who, according to Carter, “had the vision and tenacity to see this through.” “For over 50 years, Heilman has been a scholar and servant leader,” said

Carter. He added that Heilman, a chancellor at the University of Richmond in Virginia, was educated at CU.

“The rung of the ladder was never meant to rest upon, but only to hold one’s foot long enough to lift the other

higher. Today represents another rung of the ladder, another step forward, another move upward,” said Heilman. Heilman said he was honored to have his name associated with a building, which is to be a significant addition to the overall environment of the campus. “But the honor is greatly enhanced as a result of my identity

with two of our distinguished presidents who have made a great impact on the college and university over the years,” Heilman said. The student center will house the Winters Dining Hall, named in honor of former CU president Dr. Kenneth Winters and his wife, Shirley. The Winters Dining Hall will seat 600 and will include meeting space for the Campbellsville/Taylor County community.

The student center will also include the Davenport Student Commons, named for Dr. W.R. “Randy” Davenport, former CU president, and his wife, Janet. The Davenport Student Commons, which consists of 9,000 square feet, will house a new bookstore, post office, student lounge, student service offices and a 100-seat grill.

Winters, according to Carter, brought CU to a new level of operation when enrollment climbed 150 percent during his presidency from 1988 to 1999. “We’re grateful for what God did in those 11 years,” said Winters. Davenport served as CU’s president for 19 years, from 1969 to 1988, and “truly left a mark on the realm of education,” according to Carter. Davenport said he’d seen CU through her ups and downs, but “there’s one thing that’s unshakable - the Almighty God in which we place our trust, not only as an individual but as a school.”

Chairman of the board of trustees, Jerry Bennett, thanked Winters and Davenport for dreaming gloriously as former presidents and laboring daily to see their dreams come true. He also thanked Heilman for his vision for CU, which he described as having “divine intervention.” Bennett recognized Carter and said, “You, too, have a place among the dreamers. You have challenged us and still challenge us to buy into your dreams.”

The groundbreaking ceremony was followed by a celebration dinner in the Student Activities Center during which the Heilmans, Winters and Davenports were honored. ♡

Campbellsville University professor receives Tenured Faculty Award

Dr. Patricia Hartfield Cowherd, associate professor and dean of the School of Business and Economics, received the “Tenured Faculty Award” at CU’s annual Honors and Awards Day. Cowherd, who’s been employed at CU since 1977, was presented a \$3,000 check by Roy Rich, ’67, of the CU Advancement Council. Cowherd said she was “very overwhelmed and surprised.” She said CU is a “second home to me.”

In addition to serving as dean, she coordinates the master of business administration program. She has also served as the registrar, a part-time instructor, coordinator of academic counseling, assistant professor/advisor in office management/administrative technology, director of career services, director of tech-prep program and director of school-to-work program. Cowherd coordinated the dislocated workers program in Albany and helped those workers secure jobs in the community.

Campbellsville University presents second Algernon Sydney Sullivan Awards

Campbellsville University President Michael V. Carter presented the university's second Algernon Sydney Sullivan Awards to Betty Jane Gorin-Smith, a noted historian of Campbellsville, and Van Martin Thompson of Calhoun, Ky., a senior who was also named Mr. Campbellsville University. Carter said the two individuals possess the "high ideals and Christian example of Algernon Sydney Sullivan, for whom the award is named." Carter said Sullivan was an attorney, devout Christian, a mediator of conflict, powerful and appealing orator, a courageous citizen during perilous times, a noted philanthropist, and a devoted family man. In the words of a friend, Sullivan "reached out both hands in constant helpfulness to others."

"We annually recognize one graduating senior and one individual from our community who exemplify the characteristics of this prestigious award," Carter said. Each recipient was presented with a medallion and a framed certificate, and their names will be reported to the Sullivan Foundation for inclusion there along with recipients from other colleges and universities.

Thompson graduated with a major in political science and minor in philosophy. He was born and raised in Malawi, a small country in East Africa where his parents, Van and Mary Thompson are missionaries. The Thompson couple are CU alumni and attended the ceremony. During his time at CU, Thompson has earned a 4.0 grade point average and is one of CU's co-valedictorians. He was named Mr. Campbellsville for 2004 at Honors and Awards Day. Thompson eventually plans to attend law school. He and his fiancé, Jennifer Freeman, who also graduated from CU in May, were married later that night at Campbellsville Baptist

Church. He plans to work for a while before attending law school.

The community recipient was Betty Jane Gorin-Smith, who taught United States and world history in the local schools for more than two decades. She has also taught at both Campbellsville University and Lindsey Wilson College. She is a graduate of the University of Kentucky with both a bachelor of arts and master of arts. She has a rank one in teaching from Western Kentucky University and completed post rank one studies at Middle Tennessee State University and University of Virginia and was a Fulbright scholar to the Netherlands in 1987. According to Carter, her "academic and civic awards are numerous and illustrate the wide breadth of her service, knowledge, achievements and civic engagement." She has written numerous published articles and is completing a book on Civil War General John Hunt Morgan.

"Betty Jane," as her numerous friends and colleagues know her, is working with others on the University's Centennial History Committee and is recognized as one of the primary leaders of the preservation effort at the Tebbs Bend Civil War battlefield. She has been a key participant in the Heartland Civil War Trails Commission, and she has been referred to as the "Historian Laureate for the Heartland Region of Kentucky" in recognition of her vast knowledge of the history of not only Taylor County but this entire region of our Commonwealth. She is married to Gordon Smith, who teaches in the University's ESL program. They have two children, a daughter, Beth Gorin Cox, and a son, Mark Gorin, who was at the presentation. She also has four granddaughters. *

Campbellsville University hosts U.S. representatives as they learn of 'Campbellsville Comeback'

Washington, D.C. leaders heard about the city of Campbellsville's "Comeback" into economic recovery and the role Campbellsville University played in that comeback recently. Three United States representatives participated in a roundtable discussion at The Gheens Recital Hall on campus, including U.S. Rep. Ron Lewis (R-Ky.); U.S. Rep. Phil Crane (R-Ill.), chairman of the Ways and Means Trade Subcommittee; and U.S. Rep. Wally Herger (R-Calif.), chairman of the Ways and Means Human Resources Subcommittee. Lewis called Campbellsville "a poster community" for her economic recovery from the loss



of 3,500 Fruit of the Loom jobs to the creation of 3,773 new jobs announced from Oct. 1998 to Dec. 2003. Thirteen new companies operate now in Campbellsville including manufacturers, distributors like Amazon.com and international companies like Murakami Manufacturing USA, an automobile parts producer. Two of the "success stories" - Lana Wright and Karen Brockman, both of Campbellsville - talked of the devastation they felt when their jobs were discontinued. Wright, who had worked at Fruit of the Loom 15 years, said she and her husband and other family members worked there, and the loss of the plant was devastating. Brockman, who was employed at Fruit of the Loom nine years, said she was both "scared and excited" when she lost her job and was forced to try something new. Training was offered to them and other community members through various programs including the Trade Adjustment Assistance Act which paid for their education working with the university. "Campbellsville University embraced us," Wright said.

Crane said he was "extremely pleased" to listen to the success stories of the women. "I am overwhelmed with your success, and you are to be congratulated," he said. "I commend Campbellsville University also. Learning new skills is critically important," he said. Crane asked how foreign markets learned of Campbellsville as a place to build plants and was told of the many international students and contacts at Campbellsville University. A Brazilian plant, Air Safety, has located in

Campbellsville, and UpStream is now owned by Goodyear which is owned by businessmen from India. John Chowning, vice president for church and external relations and executive assistant to the president of Campbellsville University, was one of the driving forces establishing Team Taylor County (a part of the Campbellsville-Taylor County Industrial Development Authority) which worked to get new jobs in the area. "There were those who felt there was no future here," Chowning said, "but the word 'no' is not acceptable to this community."

Campbellsville University established the new Technology Training Center with a \$2 million grant obtained with the help of U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell

(R-Ky.). Lewis and U.S. Sen. Jim Bunning (R-Ky.) have also played roles in funding opportunities for Campbellsville University. Herger said Campbellsville is a "role model," and those in Washington want to study the "Campbellsville Comeback" "very carefully." "There is a lot of chemistry here and a lot of 'can do' to roll up your sleeves and get work done," he said. J.R. Wilhite, commissioner of Kentucky's Department of Community Development, said Campbellsville's need was a mission to "create real jobs in real time for real people." He complimented Campbellsville for having "no turf battles." Lewis, who is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, received an honorary doctor of public service at Campbellsville University's commencement May 8. Lewis was a supporter of the \$1.7 million Department of Education grant which allowed Campbellsville University to create a master's program in special education. The first 35 graduates of the program received master's degrees May 8 with Lewis in attendance. ♡

Campbellsville University presents Servant Leadership Awards

Campbellsville University honored two students with the Student Servant Leadership Awards recently. Corey Scott Bonds, a music education major from Scottsville, Ky., and Kwaku Osebreh, a finance/computer information system major with a math minor from Ghana, West Africa, received the awards. Through the support of the Moore Foundation and Barney II Foundation Servant Leadership Program, Bonds and Osebreh will receive a scholarship of \$1,000 for their senior year, of which \$250 is to be designated to a charity of their choice.

Bonds is donating his portion of the award money to the Taylor County High School Show Chorus. Osebreh's portion will be sent to the Galilean Children's Home in Liberty, Ky. Bonds served as assistant with the Taylor County Middle and High School bands three years and associate music minister at First United Methodist Church in Campbellsville. He has also served in Cleveland, Ohio with the Baptist Student Union Missions Team and is on the BSU fundraising committee. Bonds said his entire outlook on life has changed from being "dependent on the attention of others to understanding that the best leadership is often displayed through the quiet leader who leads by example and through service, putting others before himself as Jesus did." Bonds is the son of Jerry and Sharon Bonds of Scottsville.

Osebreh has been a resident assistant two years; a member of Phi Beta Lambda, the business honorary organization, three years; a tutor two years,





'Great champion of Christian higher education' Tom Smith, vice chair of Board of Trustees, dies

"Campbellsville University has lost a source of wise counsel and a wise visionary business mind," said Campbellsville University President Michael V. Carter. Thomas (Tom) Wyatt Smith of Danville, vice chair of the Campbellsville University Board of Trustees, died June 6 at Ephraim McDowell Regional Medical Center, where he once served as president and chief executive officer. He was 67.

"He has been one of our true leaders on our Board of Trustees," said Carter. "His commitment to excellence in Christian higher education was demonstrated time and time again through his countless volunteer hours to Campbellsville University," he said.

Smith served as chair of both the finance and business committees, two important committees, especially recently, as the members worked to improve the institution's financial standing. Carter said Smith was at the "heart" of the refinancing. "He urged us to be prudent and to be committed to serving students and faculty in a robust manner," Carter said.

Carter spoke at Smith's funeral and called him a "unique and gifted" person. "Tom Smith was special because he was so good at so many different aspects of life," Carter said at the funeral. "Tom loved serving others. He was one of the most unselfish people I have ever known." He added that Smith had touched thousands of lives through health care improvements, education, while serving on the boards of Campbellsville University and St. Catharine College, financial decisions through his work with the Federal Reserve Bank, ministry through Lexington Avenue Baptist Church and work with Rotary International.

Survivors include his wife, Malinda Parker Smith; three sons, Gregory Thomas, Bradley and Brentley Parker Smith, all of Louisville.

Campbellsville University continues legacy of man's love for the environment

Taylor County resident Alexander Hoffmann has left his legacy in the hands of Campbellsville University, according to Dr. Alan Medders, vice president for development at CU.

Campbellsville University hosted a dedication April 29 on property located on Collins Lane. The property, which includes 20.5 acres, was owned by the late Alexander Hoffmann, who immigrated to the United States from Freiburg, Germany in 1951.

Hoffmann and his family, including his daughter and her husband, Gabriela and Verner Zimmerman of Zurich, Switzerland, his brother, Ladislaus, of Washington D. C., and his niece, Alexandria, of Nashville, were honored in the dedication. Hoffmann was in the process of planting thousands of black walnut trees on his farm and renovating two 150-year-old log cabins when he died in 2002.

"Following Mr. Hoffmann's death in 2002, his family wished to continue his legacy of environmental stewardship, silviculture and conservation and they felt that Campbellsville University would maintain his legacy," said Medders. "Campbellsville University is very grateful for this wonderful gift and the opportunity to use the Alexander Hoffmann Silviculture Demonstration Area and Nature Center as one of its outstanding science programs," he said. Dr. Wesley Roberts, Hoffmann's long-time friend and professor of music at CU, spoke at the dedication. He mentioned the joy Hoffmann took in restoring the cabins and planting trees and said he marvels at the great gift CU has received. Dr. Brent Summers, chair of the division of natural science and associate professor of biology at CU, said, "We are seeing the seeds that Alexander planted start to bear fruit. He took pride in what he did, and we will carry on his tradition and respect that pride."

Summers said CU has already planned to offer classes in art, biology, composition and forestry at the site. The cabin will serve as meeting space for classes and also a place of retreat for nature researchers, students, faculty, staff and other guests. "Alexander would be happy to know a lot of learning and curiosity will happen here," said Summers.

In response to the appreciation extended to Hoffmann's family, his brother, Ladislaus, said, "My response is easy... it's an overwhelming 'thank you' to the university for taking on this project." ♦

CU graduates 335 at Tiger Field

"This is your beginning, not an end. God has been shaping you, but He's not finished," said Dr. Joseph L. Owens, pastor of Shiloh Baptist Church in Lexington and a 1977 CU graduate, as he spoke to 335 undergraduate and graduate students during commencement at Campbellsville University May 8.

Owens received an honorary doctorate of divinity. Campbellsville University President Michael V. Carter said Owens brings a "warm spirit, strong voice and proven leadership to the Christian ministry." Ron Lewis, member of the United States House of Representatives from the Second Congressional District of Kentucky, received an honorary doctorate of public service. Carter said Congressman Lewis has been supportive of many grants that have significantly impacted Campbellsville University, most recently the \$1.7 million Department of Education grant which allowed

Campbellsville University to create a master's program in special education. "It is very appropriate to honor Congressman Lewis and for him to be present during this commencement service since the first 35 graduates of the program received their master's degrees today," Carter said.

CU's 2004 graduating class has six valedictorians with perfect 4.0 grade point averages. Degrees were awarded, to 335 students: associate of science, 32; associate of arts, one; bachelor of arts, 16; bachelor of music, 13; bachelor of science, 156; bachelor of science in business administration, 27; bachelor of social work, 16; master of arts in education (curriculum and instruction), nine; master of arts in music, seven; master of arts in special education (learning and behavior disorders), 35; master of arts in social science, three; master of business administration, 15; master of music in church music, one; master of music in music education, one; and master of theology, three.
